





Our Institution

1.1. History of the Institution

Victoria Institution, originally named as The Native Ladies Normal and Adult School, was founded on 1st February, 1871, by Brahmananda Keshub Chandra Sen under the auspices of the Indian Reform Association of which he was the President. The aim of the Institution as laid down by Keshub Chandra Sen was to build up a scheme of education "specially adapted to the

requirement of the female mind and calculated

to fit woman for her position in the society." Education, he said, should be "both natural and national" and his followers pursued the aim with apostolic fervour while nurturing the Institution.

In 1932, the college section of the Institution was set up under the patronage of Maharani Suniti Devi, Maharani Sucharu Devi (daughters of Keshub Chandra) and other Board members among whom was Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy who took keen interest in the growth of the Institution and remained associated with it till death.

The college which started I.A. course in 1932 soon became a first grade women's college teaching upto B.A. Honours course in several subjects (1935). The science section of the college was opened in 1950. To meet the growing demand from the girls aspiring for higher education the Morning Section of the college was opened in 1963. In the Platinum Jubilee Year (2006-07) the college introduced B.Com. (Hons.) course. At present the college has 8 departments in Arts and 8 departments in Science sections conducting Honours, and General courses for nearly 3007 students. It is also a study centre for distance education of Netaji Subhas Open University.

Over the years goals and objectives of the Victoria Institution (College) have been redefined keeping in mind women's growing role in different sectors of public life. But Keshub Chandra Sen's "comprehensive scheme of education" through special lectures, distance education ('antapur shiksha'), vocational training and physical training still forms the core of the education system of the Victoria Institution (College).

For more than seven decades the Victoria Institution (College) has been rendering commendable service for the promotion of women's education in Bengal combining successful heritage tradition with modernisation. The mission of the college is to realize the founder's dream "one society, one religion, one world".

 - provides an excellent atmosphere where students from all communities and all strata can cordially interact with one another in group activities and excursions and enrich the campus life.



3. Evaluation System



Examinations at the college

3.1. Continuous evaluation of the students by the faculties:

The students' knowledge and skill of a particular subject is continuously assessed by the faculty through class tests, tutorials, written assignments, quiz and pre-final test. Students are encouraged to improve their performance in various ways and remedial classes are arranged for the underperformers. Guardians are called to

apprise them of their wards' performance. College retains the right of withholding students from sitting for C.U. Exam if they do not improve their performance even after repeated warnings.

3.2. Rules and regulations regarding examination

- The 3 year B.A./ B.Sc. / B.Com. (Honours and General) Course of Studies under CBCS shall consist of Six (6) Semesters (Semester-II, Semester-III, Semester-IV, Semester-VI)
- End Semester Examinations are to be held ordinarily at the end of the concerned Semester, i.e., Semester-I, Semester-III, Semester-V in December January and Semester-II, Semester-IV Semester -VI in June-July.
- End Semester Examinations will be held for 80% of the total marks in each paper and Internal Assessment shall be for 20% of the total marks of each paper / subject / module. 50% of the total marks assigned to Internal Assessment (i.e., 10 marks for a full paper of 100 or 5 marks for a Module of 50, as the case may be) will be assessed on the basis of Internal Examination and remaining 50% will be assessed based on the class attendance (6 marks for attending 60% or above but less than 75% of the number of lectures delivered; 8 marks for attending 75% or above but less than 90% of the number of lectures delivered; and 10 marks for attending 90% or above of lectures delivered and such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or date of admission whichever is later).

- The students are to be informed about the modalities of internal assessment well in advance.
- First semester classes for B.A./B.Sc. / B.Com. courses of studies shall commence ordinarly within thirty days from the date of publication of results of the H.S. Examination of the year conducted by the West Bengal Coucil of Higher Secondary Education. Classes for second semester to sixth semester shall commence ordinarly within seven days from the date of completion of lower semester examination of the year respectively (e.g. class of 2nd semester shall commence within seven days from the completion of 1st semester examination).
- An affiliated College/ Institution shall submit application form in prescribed from at duly filled in by the candidates intending to appear at the said examination(s) to the Controller of Examinations within the last date fixed by the University.
- Admit Card for an examination shall not be issued to the college concerned in favour of a candidate unless her application duly filled-up in all respects and particularly in regard to :
 - i) date of admisssion to the first semester class with current subject combination, ii) year of first appearance in the examination of the semester concerned and iii) year(s) of appearance (s) in the semester-I / semester-II / and semester-III / semester-IV / semester-V / semester-VI Examinations as the case may be together with the results thereof and such other information as may be required from time to time and duly endorsed by the Principal testifying her a) good conduct, b) requisite attendance record in theoretical and practical/tutorial classes in each of the subjects in which she intends to appear and c) eligibility under this regualtions for appearance at the conncerned examination and in the said subject(s).
- A candidate pursuing Honours Course of Study has to secure 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical / Tutorial Part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester Examinations, and a minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including marks in Internal Assessment) in order to earn the corresponding credit of the concerned paper and a minimum of CGPA 4.000 (including Internal Assessment) taking all the papers of all the Semesters as a whole, i.e., all CC, DSE, SEC, GE & AECC papers, in order to get Honours Degree.
- If candidate pursuing <u>Honours Course of Study</u> secures 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical /Tutorial part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester Examination, and minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including Internal Assessment), but fails to secure a minimum of CGPA 4.000 (including Internal Assessment) taking all the papers of all the Semesters as a whole, i.e. all CC, DSE, SEC, GE & AECCpaper will get the General Degree.

However, such candidate may re-appear at the 5th End Semester Examinations or 6th End Semester Examinations or both, when such examinations will be held next, within the stipulated period of five years in order to get a minimum of CGPA 4.000 and get the Honours Degree. In case, such examinee fails to obtain a minimum of CGPA 4.000, the previous status based on previous aggregate will be retained and such candidate will not be declared as having obtained General Degree again.

- A candidate pursuing <u>General Course of Study</u> has to secure 30% marks (excluding the marks in Internal Assessment) separately in Theory and Practical/Tutorial part of each paper, wherever applicable, at the End Semester Examinations and a minimum of 30% marks in each paper (including marks in Internal Assessment) in order to earn the corresponding credit of the concerned paper and to get the General Degree.
- A candidate who is eligible to appear at any of the End Semester Examinations does not enroll or does not appear at the examinations or fails to secure pass marks in the paper(s) at the concerned examinations, as stated above, as well as a candidate not eligible to appear at the End Semester Examination, will be allowed to attend the classes in the next higher semester, as applicable.
- Internal Assessment has to be done in the semester in which a candidate becomes eligible to appear in the concerned End Semester Examination. The candidates remaining absent in the internal examination will be awarded zero (0) marks. Marks obtained in Internal Assessment (i.e., marks for attendance and marks of internal examination taken together) shall be retained for the entire duration of her enrolment
- If a candidate secures pass marks in Practical Paper(s)/ Module(s)/ Project Work/ Tutorial but fails to secure pass marks in Theoretical paper(s)/ module, the marks of Practical Paper(s)/ Module(s)/ Project Work/ Tutorial along with Internal Assessment shall be retained.

Re-examination/Review

- i. Re-Examination/review is applicable only for Theoretical papers of different End Semester Examinations of 3 year BA/B.Sc./B.Com. Course of Studies. Re-examination/review is not permissible for Internal Assessment, Practical & Tutorial Examinations and Project Work
- ii. A candidate will be eligible to re-examine/review her script if she appears at the concerned Semester examination as a whole.
- iii. A student shall be allowed to apply for re-examination/ review of not more than 2(two) Theoretical papers/modules in each semester i.e. CC, DSE, SEC and GE for Honours Courses and CC, DSE, SEC and GE (wherever applicable) for General Courses, taken together, provided that she has scored qualifying marks, i.e., 30% in the remaining papers of that Semester.
- iv. In re-examination of papers for any End Semester Examinations of 3 year BA/B. Sc./B.Com. Courses, then marks awarded by the re-examiner in a paper will be taken as the marks obtained by the candidate in that paper. If on re-examination/

review of a paper, the marks get enhanced by more than 15% or get reduced by more than by 5% than that awarded by the original examiner (the percentage is to be calculated on the basis of the full marks in that paper], the script of the paper shall be referred to a third examiner. Among the marks awarded by three examiners, i.e., original examiner, second examiner (re-examiner] and the third examiner, the average of the two closer marks obtained will be awarded, provided that such a final award does not result in lowering of the Grade Point obtained by the candidate-prior to re-examination/review in which cases the original award be retained.

Cancellation of Examination

Candidate may apply through the Principal for cancellation of enrollment of the concerned end semester examination within fifteen working days from the date of completion of theory papers of the said examinations. Such option for cancellation of examination once exercised cannot be revoked.

3.3. Rules regarding attendance

- 1. A student attending at least 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to appear at the concerned Semester Examinations subject to fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- 2. A student attending at least 60% but less than 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to appear at the concerned Semester Examinations subject to the payment of prescribed condonation fees and fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- 3. A student attending less than 60% of the total number of classes* held shall not be allowed to appear at the concerned Semester Examinations and she has to pursue admission to the same Semester in the very next year for attending the classes and appearing at the said Semester Examination.
 - *Such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or the date of admission, whichever is later.

No exception shall be made to the aforementioned regulations, under any circumstances. Leave application has to be produced by the student if she remains absent from the college for 3 or more consecutive days. Students securing highest percentage of attendance will be awarded with a prize in the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony of the College.

4. Facilities

4.1. Hostel

Since its inception, Victoria Institution (College) Hostel has been engaged in ensuring affordable, accommodation facilities for its outstation students. The Hostel is a three storeyed building with spacious rooms housing nearly 72 students from various parts of Bengal. Being located within the college campus, the resident students do not have to undertake the cumbersome journey to reach their classes everyday.

Over the last few years, extensive refurbishment work has been undertaken. In recent times, the hostel building has been extended to include two dormitories with attached washrooms. However, allocation of these rooms is made in accordance to merit.

The day to day functioning is taken care of by a female Hostel Warden. The Principal personally meets the resident students to understand their everyday challenges and occasionally arranges for interactive sessions with their guardians to discuss the problem.



Accommodation and Amenities

- Rooms: The rooms have ergonomically designed furnitures that include bed with fitted mattresses, individual Study Desks, lockers and Cupboards with hangers.
- Toilets: The hostel has ample clean toilets with attached baths and solar heaters to provide hot water in winters.
- Reading Room: Every floor of the hostel has a separate reading room. The reading room has computers and free high speed unlimited Wi Fi connection, Boarders can access this room tell 12 midnight. In addition an extended balcony with lights, desks and chairs is also available to facilitate late night study.
- Security: 24 X 7 security with guards at the main door at all times and CCTVs are installed to monitor entry and exit of the hostel, while maintaining privacy of the residents. After college hours students are allowed to go outside with Gate Pass from the Warden. However returning to hostel at 8 pm. is mandatory.
- Food: Apart from usual lunch and dinner, the hostel mess also serves 2 light meals and one heavy snack after college hours. The students are provided fresh food with nutritive value. Non-vegetarian food consisting of either fish or eggs is served everyday. The menu is decided in the beginning of each week, in consultation with the boarders. Special menu is planned for Sundays. The food in served in presence of the Hostel Warden.
- Recreation: The residents have an access to various indoor and outdoor games.
 Television is installed in the dining area where boarders can watch news everyday
 and other entertainment programs on Sundays. The boarders also receive the
 Daily Newspaper. Various cultural programmes are also organised to ensure
 bonding among students.

STUDENTS HEALTH HOME MEMBERSHIP: The Institution has long been a Universal Member of Student's Health Home. The boarders can avail this facility and get almost all their medical treatment from this organisation at a very nominal cost.

Hostel seats of students who are unable to qualify at the Calcutta University Examinations will be cancelled.

 The College Hostel is a home-away from home. The hostel is a safe space for the students and allows them to embrace an identity of womanhood that is confident, poised and ready to grapple the challenges of the world.






4.9. NCC

The outdoor clinic remains open from 12 to 2 P.M. from Monday to Saturday.

- Students are allowed to download updated matter from the net.

4.14. Students' Poor Fund

There is a special student's Aid Fund which extends financial help to students with financial constraints and those who do not get any other scholarships. The objective is to enable them to purchase books and educational aids, meet College Fees, University Examination Fees and other necessary expenses.

In addition to the above we have Students Medical Benefit Fund formed by the contribution of students. Every student pays Rs. 10 per annum towards the maintenance of the fund. This is a contingency fund created to tackle emergency situations like an accident or a critical medical need faced by any student. A body consisting of the Principal, teaching staff and non-teaching staff oversees the disbursement of the fund.

4.15. Prizes Awarded

Prizes are given to the students of the college for academic excellence and to the meritorious but economically disadvantaged students from the following Funds:

 There is an Endowment Fund for Prizes created from donation made by Sm. Nilima Datta, Ex-Prof., Dept. of Zoology; Sm. Sukla Sen, Ex-Prof. Dept. of Sanskrit; the family of Late Dr. Dipali Datta, Ex-Reader Dept. of Chemistry for meritorious students pursuing Zoology Honours Course, Sanskrit Honours Course and B.Sc. General Course with Chemistry respectively.

• There is special fund for Prizes created from donation made by the family of the late Prof. Ratna Sen (Dept. of Philosophy) and the family of the late Dr. Samita Ghosh (Dept. of English) for the highest scorer in Philosophy (Hons.) and English (Hons.) respectively in B.A. Examination.

All kinds of help is extended in terms of books, loans and free studentship, concession in hostel charges, etc. to visually and physically challenged students. We also make conscious effort to accommodate these students in the hostel if required. Such students are requested to contact the office for further details.

4.17. Provision for Generator

Massive power-cuts that seriously hamper academic and other allied activities in the college are tackled by the generator set for emergency power supply for the college. Students are charged an additional Rs. 10 per month to meet the recurring expenses.

4.18. Eco-friendly Measures

The institution believes in an eco-friendly campus. The college has endeavoured to establish the campus as a "Zero waste Zone" through the concept of "reduce, reuse and recycle". The college has also taken initiatives to include solar panels to facilitate Thermal water heaters and rain water harvesting.

5. Distance Education

Victoria Institution — Netaji Subhas Open University Study Centre

The College is a Study Centre for Netaji Subhas Open University for distance

education. Regular counselling programmes are conducted in the College Centre on Saturdays and Sundays for the University. The courses which are at present being offered at the NSOU Victoria Institution (College) Centre are as follows:

- 2 yrs. Post Graduate Diploma in Public Relations and Advertising (PGDPR & Ad.)
- 1 yr. Diploma Course in (i) Cooperation, (ii) Consumer Affairs.
- 1 yr. Bachelor of Library and Information Science.
- Certificate course on Human Rights (6 months).
- Certificate course (six month) on Pre-Primary Teachers' Training (in English and Bengali medium) is conducted on a collaboration basis by the Netaji Subhas Open University, Victoria Institution (College) and Learning and Living Resources Society at the College Study Centre. "The course is designed to impart a thorough and practical training in pre-primary child education based on the Montessori methods. The training provides an excellent foundation for all those who are involved or likely to be involved in pre-primary education, including teachers and parents."

N.B. — Any student of Victoria Institution (Day & Morning sections) studying B.A./B.Sc. course under Calcutta University can simultaneously pursue any Certificate Course and BDP (Bachelor's Degree Programme) course of NSOU.

6. Career Oriented Certified Computer Course

Victoria Institution (College) in collaboration with WEBEL Technology Ltd. (Govt. of W.B. Undertaking) has introduced Computer Literacy and Tranning Programe for the Students.

7. Seminars, Workshops a nd Extension Lectures

Great care is taken to stimulate the academic life of the Institution through varied programmes like Seminars, Workshops and Extension Lectures on various topics of interest undertaken by the faculties.

These programmes supplement class room teaching and provide students with opportunities to listen to and interact with the renowned speakers from various fields, to improve their communication skill, to get exposure to a varied mode of teaching and to enrich their mental faculty. These activities, help generateing social awareness among the students. Students are also encouraged to present papers in seminars.
